WV-CAG also worked with the WV Climate Alliance to hold a big rally at Charleston's federal courthouse plaza on the eve of

Legislative Forecast

Winter is coming, and that means the legislative session is just around the corner. With so much time and energy focused on federal issues, it's been hard to think about the legislative session — and, especially looking back at the 2021 session it's hard to see much good coming out of what's been dubbed "the Bad Idea Factory." However, we had a few wins, and especially in the current climate, sometimes victory means holding the line and not losing ground. As 2021 comes to a close and we head into a new year, and another legislative session, here are some issues we expect to take up time and attention under the dome.

Courts/Access to Justice - Big changes are coming to West Virginia's judicial system, after the passage in 2021

of SB 275, which established a new intermediate court of appeals that will review most trial court decisions before they reach the state Supreme Court. SB 275 also made other significant changes to the process of appealing objections to workers compensation claims that attorneys for injured workers say will politicize the process and deny or delay justice for their clients. These changes have been long sought by corporate interests, but their efforts to undermine access to justice for regular West Virginians have no bounds.

Among the items still on their wish list is **restricting access to medical monitoring when someone** is **exposed to a dangerous toxin or defective product**. While it may take years for some diseases caused by that exposure, such as cancer, to develop, those who are exposed to the dangerous toxins need to have regular medical monitoring so that treatment can start as soon as any illnesses are found. Refusing to allow medical testing until disease occurs could be a death sentence. Early detection allows for early treatment which saves time, money and lives, but greedy corporations, the same ones pushing for the changes to our water quality standards described below, want to prohibit medical monitoring claims until someone gets sick, defeating the very rationale for these claims.

Health Care - Building on past successes capping insulin copays and adding adult dental coverage to Medicaid, the WV Health Care for All coalition has a new agenda that they will be working to pass in the upcoming session to ensure that all West Virginians have access to quality, comprehensive affordable health care. Racial Justice and Non-Discrimination - Although bills to prohibit hair discrimination and to protect members of the LQBTQ community from dicrimination in employment and housing stalled in previous sessions, advocates for the CROWN (Create a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair) Act and the Fairness Act aren't giving up the fight. They've also been making significant headway at the local level. In the months since the 2021 legislative session ended, at least four cities (Charleston, Morgantown, Beckley and Lewisburg) across the state have adopted CROWN Act ordinances which ban discrimination against based on hairstyles associated with race, such as natural Black hair or dredlocks. In July, South Charleston became the 15th city in West Virginia to ban LGBTQ discrimination. This year, Charleston and Morgantown also passed bans on conversion therapy, a a pseudoscientific practice where a medical provider attempts to change someone's sexual

orientation or gender identity.

Reproductive Justice/Bodily Autonomy - On December 1, the nation watched as the US Supreme Court heard oral arguments in a case that directly challenges Roe v. Wade, the precedent setting case that has protected reproductive freedom for millions of Americans for nearly 50 years. If the Court overturns Roe, half the states in the US are poised to ban abortion entirely, including West Virginia.

Ultra-conservative legislators are chomping at the bit to impose further restrictions on abortion access in West Virginia after the Court refused to halt a Texas law banning abortions after six weeks from taking effect. This is a red alert moment for reproductive freedom. The right to decide if or when to have a child is essential to a person's ability to make highly personal decisions about their bodies and their futures. It is essential for social, economic, and racial equality in this country.

Tax and Budget - During the 2021 session, WV CAG was part of a coalition of groups that helped defeat a bill to eliminate West Virginia's personal income tax. The proposal would have overwhelmingly benefited the wealthy by replacing the income tax with higher sales taxes that would be a net tax increase for low and middle income families, while also blowing a huge hole in the budget that would have resulted in huge cuts to critical programs and services. Although, people power played a major role in defeating the income tax repeal, disagreement between the House and the Senate was also factored in, so look for it's return in 2022.

Voting Rights & Democracy - You may recall that one of last year's victories was the defeat of a bill (SB 565) that would have eliminated the most popular days of early voting, gutted automatic voter registration and start the process of removing voters from rolls after two years (instead

of four) if someone hasn't voted. With voting rights under attack around the county — this year, 19 states have enacted 33 laws that will make it harder for Americans to vote — we fully expected to see this proposal again in 2022, if not sooner. It's important we remain vigilant and prepared to and ready to mobilize against measures to restrict access to voting in West Virginia.



These threats to our freedom to vote make it critical that Congress set national standards to ensure that all Americans have equal access to the ballot ahead of the 2022 elections. Passing the Freedom to Vote Act is our best opportunity to respond to these threats to our democracy, further voter protections, strengthen election integrity, reign in dark money, and end partisan and racial gerrymandering. Call Senators Machin and Capito today and urge their support.

Water Quality Standards - One of the anticipated policies that will be up for debate is a WV Department of Environmental Protection rule making revisions to the state's water quality standards. The proposed changes are part of a second round of revisions to the human health criteria, the portion of our water quality standards that protect our health from dangerous pollutants like cancer causing toxins, chemicals known to cause birth-defects, and poisons like cyanide.

As proposed, the rule would allow more toxins in our drinking water sources AND create a loophole for polluters to discharge even more toxins in our water with less public involvement. Prior to the rule going before the full Legislature, it will be considered by the Legislative Rule-Making Review Committee, which can approve, disapprove or amend the proposed rule. The action by the Committee will set the tone for what happens during the legislative session.

WV New Jobs Coalition:

Connecting with West Virginians

The WV New Jobs Coalition (www.newjobswv.org), formed at the beginning of 2021, is our collaboration with WV Working Families Party, Service Employees International Union local 1199, WV Sierra Club, and others with the vision of bringing new, well-paying clean energy and care jobs to the Mountain State. Part of that vision includes making our state a place where people want to live and work, raise families, and retire. This means championing Jobs, Care, and Democracy.

Our coalition hosted events across the state, in tandem with canvassing outreach into the community. This spring, we kicked off with a simultaneous three city concert called **Jammin for Jobs**, both live and online. Summer began with a six city Summer Jam tour starting in Huntington and ending in Shepherdstown, followed by a rally in DC. The rest of the summer into fall, weekly actions were also held outside of Senator Manchin's and/or Capito's offices, to emphasise that we needed them to bring home both Build Back Better and what eventually became the Freedom to Vote Act. We made some solid connections, but more was needed.

From September through November, the Coalition delved deeper to build more direct connections with West Virginians, and we did this through both phone and door-to-door deep canvassing. The more that average West Virginians find out about the new employment opportunities, support

for child and eldercare, cost savings on prescription drugs, democracy protections and all the rest of the benefits we shared through these voter contacts, the more folks



opted to contact our Senators to urge them to get these bills passed. Our coalition work has resulted in thousands of West Virginians taking action!

Both Build Back Better and the Freedom to Vote Act are still in negotiations but we're hearing that Congressional leaders want to wrap them up before the end of the year so keep those calls and letters coming!

Next year will bring new challenges and opportunities for this power-building coalition and WV Citizen Action is ready to be part of the action in 2022! §



In October, the Legislature convened in special session to draw new boundaries for state legislative and congressional districts. Despite the good intentions of some members of the Joint Committee on redistricting for the process to be open and transparent with ample opportunity for public input, the approved maps were drawn behind closed doors and ignored the pleas of residents around the state who asked that their communities be kept whole. The final House of Delegates plan unnecessarily divides many communities and towns across the state, including Elkins, Lewisburg, and Shepherdstown, as well as the historic and majority Black community of Institute and the neighboring town of Dunbar, which also has a large African-American population. The House maps were approved by a nearly party-line vote after the Republican majority blocked a number of amendments that Democrats proposed to address concerns raised by constituents and local elected officials in their districts.

Similarly, the final Senate redistricting plan, which was

passed after considerable drama and disagreement within the Republican party ranks, carves up some of the state's largest counties, attaching portions of their urban areas to adjacent rural counties that are more conservative. Kanawha County will now be divided into three districts instead of two. Monongalia County remains split between two districts, even though the county's population only deviates from the target population of 105,513 by 309 people, large enough to have its own district.

Experts and advocates warned that this year's redistricting process was particularly prone to gerrymandering as the WV House of Delegates moved from a mix of single and multi-member districts to comply with a law the Legislature passed in 2018 that requires all delegates be elected from single-member districts for the first time in the state's history. And that's exactly what happened.

The public was told that neither voting behavior nor... the addresses of incumbents were considered, however, both the House and Senate plans have a decidedly Republican lean, giving the majority party a significant advantage in elections over the next decade.

Kathy Ferguson of Dunbar, pictured to the left, talked about the history of Institute, the community around the historically Black college West Virginia State University, at a public hearing on the House of Delegates redistricting plan on October, 13, 2021. She objected to the way Institute would be divided.

"I'm asking you to please consider redrawing those lines.I'm asking you to make an amendment so we can at least stay together.

Let us love one another. Let us vote together. Let us stick together."

Fair districting should reflect the will of the people, rather than ignoring or undermining their political preferences. Actually taking voters' preferences into account so that the potential makeup of both bodies would be proportional to total votes cast for candidates of each party in prior elections would have resulted in fairer, more competitive districts than what we ended up with.



The outcome has only reinforced calls for establishing an independent redistricting commission rather than letting legislators draw the maps that govern their own elections. Although commissions in some states have given this potential solution a bad wrap for falling short this cycle, experts have pointed out that most of the problems have surfaced in states with poorly designed commissions that


leave partisan actors heavily in the mix.

Short of an independent commission, establishing a specific list of factors that can/cannot be considered in the redistricting process, including factors designed to promote partisan fairness and prevent favoritism toward incumbents, as well as requiring public hearings be held **after** redistricting plans are proposed but **before** they are adopted, would go along way toward improving the process.

Additionally, with hyper-partisan legislative and congressional maps being adopted around the country it's critical that we pass the Freedom to Vote Act to end partisan gerry-mandering once and for all. The House of Representatives already passed this transformative legislation to protect our freedom to vote and realize the promise of democracy for all. It's urgent that the Senate acts before it's too late to counter the attacks on voting rights before the 2022 elections and before a decade of partisan gerrymandering takes hold.



"I was dead in a helicopter."

Alan Brown had COVID-19 in January of 2021, and it was miserable but manageable. He felt lucky. Then, a few weeks later, he was in the ER.

"This thing called MIS-A. My immune system reacted so violently to the COVID antibodies that it started putting my organs in a state of shock. I was in heart - liver - kidney - lung failure. I was in ICU for almost a week."

The final bill was almost \$600,000. "That's a very expensive couple of weeks." Thankfully, his insurance covered most of it. But, his out-of-pocket costs were in excess of \$30,000 which is more than many working West Virginians earn in a year. "Even though I met my deductible, there's still medicine I'm going to have to take for like a while. It's just kind of crazy to think about how expensive it is to [get to] live."

Health Care for All WV, our coalition partnership with West Virginians for Affordable Health Care and the West Virginia Center on Budget and Policy, has been working to make health care in our state more affordable and accessible.

To that end, they have been reaching out to West Virginians to listen to their health care stories. Through our partnership with Health Care for America Now Education Fund, West Virginia Citizen Action Education Fund is lending a

hand in collecting these stories and helping to share them beyond our state to our federal policy makers.

What kind of stories are we looking for? Here's a list of questions that might help clarify:

- Are you living with little to no HEALTH CARE coverage?
- Are co-pays, out of pocket expenses, or prescription drug prices overwhelming?
- Are you struggling with the health and economic consequences of COVID-19?
- Have you benefited from the Affordable Care Act, Medicare, Medicaid?
- Does lack of affordable HOME CARE (child, elder, etc.) or PAID LEAVE (Family/Medical) affect your ability to work? Is the process of applying for and/ or receiving Paid Leave overwhelming?

If any of these hit home for you or someone you know, we would love to hear your story.

Our goal is to use these stories to help educate the public, the media, as well as our state legislators, and members of Congress on what it's like for the average West Virginian just trying to seek and receive health care.

Our policy makers won't know unless we tell them.

I've shared my story. I was working full-time as contract labor. I had no sick days. When I was sick and lost time, I either had to make that time up or I simply had to accept a smaller check. I had put off procedures, treatments, and refills because we just didn't have the disposable cash to pay for it. And, I had coverage through my husband. Our two-income household still didn't bring in enough for us to get the care we needed. We were better off than most.

The reality for most West Virginians is struggle — struggle to afford out-of-pocket expenses, struggle to afford insurance, struggle to stay healthy enough to work and keep a job, especially if that

job doesn't provide health insurance. Most of us in West Virginia have chronic health issues. Most of us are working and still struggling. And those West Virginians who cannot work are struggling the most.

WE NEED TO BUILD BACK BOLDER

House passage of the President's major social infrastructure agenda now puts our Senior Senator in the spotlight as a needed swing vote and we're counting on him to get this one over the goal line. Build Back Better (BBB) is just what is needed right now because roads and bridges are not enough to fix our country. Just as our pavement and steel infrastructure has been neglected, so have the girders that underpin our social support for our kids, elders, families and communities. We need to Build Back our human infrastructure to heal our nation.

For instance, the minimum wage has not even kept up with inflation over the past 40 years and its purchasing power

has declined by nearly a third since 1968. Too many can't afford the cost of childcare in order to hold a job. It's still common for someone who has worked and saved all their life to get sick and go bankrupt, losing house, savings, and everything. College and higher education is now unaffordable for far too many of our young adults. I could go on and on...

Hence the excitement and anticipation generated by what is the most comprehensive rebuild to our society's foundations since the original New Deal. Build Back Better will also help 'unrig' our economic system, which is now designed to benefit the wealthy and Wall Street. It delivers

once in a generation policies to lower everyday costs for working families. Contrary to the misleading TV and radio commercials, it will not increase taxes for anyone except the wealthy. BBB is paid for by a millionaire/billionaire wealth tax and by making multinational corporations pay their fair share of income taxes. It's about time!

You and 99% of those reading this all pay our income taxes. They are taken right out of our paychecks. However, according to an <u>April article in Fortune 500 magazine</u>, 55 of their list of profitable companies like Nike; Amazon; FedEx; even Zoom paid NO income taxes in 2020 – that's how bad the system is rigged right now. BBB is a step toward balance in this regard.

Build Back Better has been slammed and misrepresented by conservatives, but still, when individual parts of it are polled in WV, it receives majority support. In fact, <u>support increases significantly higher</u> after voters are told it's mostly paid for by making millionaires, billionaires, and taxdodging mega corporations pay up on their taxes.

Her are some of those individual parts in the BBB bill now in the Senate.

Lower Health Care Costs: Medicare will begin to negotiate Rx costs with Big Pharma and seniors will save big! Medicare will also start covering hearing aids.

It places a \$35 a month cap on insulin costs, saving diabetics hundreds every month.

BBB reduces Affordable Care Act marketplace premiums – estimated to cut WV's uninsured population by over 1/4 - a 38,000 drop in folks without insurance in our state.

Lower Childcare & Family Care Costs: Most families will see up to 50% reduction in childcare expenses, andt the rest of our country would now have what WV has – universal preschool for 3-4 year olds.

Paid family and medical leave could replace as much as \$200 Million a year in lost income by WV workers who have to take unpaid time off to care for sick family members.

BBB would continue the expanded Child Tax Credit. 98% of WV kids would be helped with essential needs through this policy.

An affordable housing program would help an estimated 8,000 West Virginians stay housed.

Addresses Climate with Renewable Energy: A 10 Year investment in Clean Energy & Civilian Climate Corps modeled after CCC will help us transition to a carbon neutral future where our grandkids can live and thrive. Clean energy manufacturing jobs will blossom building turbine blades and solar panels in the US now instead of importing from China.

Naysayers are wrong on BBB.

Opponents say we can't afford it, even though it's mostly paid for by increased revenue as described above. Then, when that's debunked they say it'll increase inflation, which also has been debunked. Finally, they resort to the 'Socialism' boogeyman, a fear mongering criticism that is usually equated with communism and totalitarianism. Yeah, right, if we make sure kids have enough to eat and their parents can afford childcare and eldercare so they can get to work, our country is going to turn into Russia. Please give me a break from that tired, stale propaganda.

Democratic Socialism consists of our society deciding, through its democratically elected representatives, to make sure that everyone has what they need to build healthy families, communities and to THRIVE.
